 A community energy plan is a comprehensive long-term plan to assess a community's main energy uses, resources and constraints, and priorities.



Community Energy Plan

- Usually includes collecting baseline data, combined with input from the community on priority issues and technical experts on technology options
- Can help a community set priorities and identify where and how to achieve energy efficiency, reduce electricity consumption and assess opportunities for renewable energy solutions, etc.
